14:30 – 16:30 WORKSHOP 3 - A Temple for Cassandra

Emily PILLINGER, Priyanka BASU, and Rowan GARD (King's College London)

'A Temple for Cassandra' combines insights from the creators' respective areas of research, performing arts, and activism. Our objective is to design an immersive scenography that will probe the fear and frustration – and glimmers of hope – that accompany looking into our world's uncertain future. The project foregrounds different ways of knowing and experiencing the world: it starts from the words of the prophet Cassandra, then integrates elements of indigenous Polynesian storytelling and navigation methods, global digital soundscapes, and classical Indian dance. Our aim is to create a mythic world in which Cassandra's communications have been transformed into twenty-first century communications with the natural world, with the spiritual / divine, and with our future selves.
